391 students:

<u>Participation</u>

Participation is critical to this course. It is an advanced seminar that prepares only the most serious students for graduate school (in sociology and other fields). Collegial participation is of note for any letters of reference based on this course.

How do you participate?

Take an interest in the research being done by the other students. Bring to class (or, better, post to Moodle) notes, ideas, newspaper clippings, references to articles, books, etc. Think outside the box. Include poems, chapters from novels, video clips,

etc. Each student in the class will have their own Moodle forum, so that posts and responses relate to her or his work only. You will also participate by presenting your own work to the class. This will include informal discussions of your work and the circulation of parts of your writing to the class.

What will we do in this class?

- meet and discuss our writing
- distribute drafts of writing
- read Mills, <u>The Sociological Imagination</u> through the year
- discuss/make REB applications
- discuss graduate school applications/scholarships
- discuss preparing a CV
- practice oral presentations
- discuss any other issues and concerns raised by students
